We are requesting that the Hills Brothers Coffee greenhouse and property located at 14700 Manuella Rd be designated as a landmark based on its historical, architectural, cultural and aesthetic significance per Los Altos Hills Municipal Code 11-1.01.

The Hills Brothers Coffee Estate in Los Altos Hills was built around 1914 by Ruben Wilmarth (R.W.) Hills, one of the founding brothers of Arabian Coffee and Spice Mills in San Francisco (established in 1882 and later renamed to Hills Brothers Coffee in 1906.) The original estate was made up of the current properties at 14790 Manuella Rd. (main house – demolished in 2003); 14780 Manuella Rd. (pool house – extensively redesigned and remodeled in 1997 and 2005); 14700 Manuella Rd. (greenhouse, cottage and workshop) and 14667 Saltamontes Way (Barn – demolished around 1965). The architectural design is Spanish Colonial Revival, typical in California during the early 1910's and 20's. The structures on the properties were reinforced with steel framing, likely influenced from the 1906 earthquake. The steel framing was constructed by Soule's Steel Company which was also used to construct many other Bay Area high rises and notable structures, including the UC Berkley Stadium and the footings of the Golden Gate Bridge (https://www.sfgate.com/news/article/SOULE-Edward-Lee-Jr-2591884.php). Other noteworthy parts of the original construction include an above ground water well (pictured below); "knee-bent" Spanish roof tiles (fingerprints can still be seen); a large pergola that is now mostly enclosed as part of the exposed ceiling in living room, intricate Spanish-style doors, windows and hardware and steel gears that lift the glass panels on the top and sides of the greenhouse.

We purchased the home in 2017 and as we learned of its history we made significant efforts to repair and restore the existing wood, tile, doors, steel gears and function to match the original design by R.W. Hills for the greenhouse, cottage and grounds. Even though the kitchen/dining was originally a workshop until 1940's, we have also maintained all the steel framing, windows and restored the original Douglas fir ceiling and steel-framed skylights. Much of the historical significance of the property surrounds the greenhouse, which was originally intended to grow coffee botanicals for experimentation and future development for the company. Although R.W. and the property caretaker did not have much success with coffee crops, they were able to successfully

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grow avocado plants and purported to have supplied a Stanford/Cal Big Game luncheon during the 1930's. Over the years since, the greenhouse has remained in use by artists, potters, jewelers and woodwookers.

We believe the history and architectural charm of the property at 14700 Manuella Rd. should be maintained in perpetuity and make it an excellent candidate to be designated as a historical landmark under Los Altos Hills Municipal Code 11-1.01. Hills Barn, above, was located near the intersection of Salamontes Way and Estacada Drive in Los Altos Hills. Reuben Wilmarth Hills purchased the land, which had been the Clayton Fruit Ranch, in the early 1910s. In 1915, it was reported that he was "making extensive improvements about the place." Reuben and his brother, Austin Herbert Hills, founded Hills Brothers Coffee of San Francisco.
